The Oradell Public School District is committed to providing students with both the skills they need to be successful in the classroom now and with the tools they will need to be successful in the boardrooms, emergency rooms, and courtrooms of tomorrow. These key 21st century skills students will need are often referred to as the four Cs: communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and creativity.

At OPS, we target these skills in a multitude of manners. For example, we deliberately integrate technology projects that foster collaboration, critical thinking, and creativity. This includes having students make digital movies that connect to their learning about American history or by using applications such as Google Docs and classroom blogs to allow for collaboration and communication as students work on group projects or share their thinking about current events. Google



Docs also allows students and their teachers to work collaboratively, with teachers being able to instantly comment and provide feedback on student learning.

Social and emotional learning also continues to be a

district and school focus. Our goal is to provide students with the tools necessary to deal with anxiety, social pressures, and conflict resolution. Our school counselor has created numerous school-wide programs that focus on having students learn to reflect on their thoughts and actions while also developing self-regulation techniques and stronger interactional skills with their peers. Along with developing strategies for taking care of themselves, OPS is also focused on creating opportunities for students to take care of others, whether that be creating cards for troops overseas, organizing and donating to a highly successful annual food drive, participating in the Frosty's Friends program, which supplies holiday gifts for families, or collecting items for hospitalized children. Each of these service opportunities allows our community to unite together with a common goal and also allows students to see that they can impact the world.

The Oradell Public School district acknowledges that for students to be global citizens who lead tomorrow, we must educate the whole child – academically, socially, and emotionally – today.

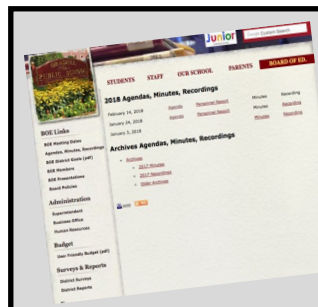

Did You Know...?

- ◆ In the past five years, OPS has upgraded its infrastructure to allow for wireless access throughout the building, and all students in grades 3-6 and all staff members have access to their own laptops during the school day.
- ◆ While OPS values technology education, all students in grades K-4 are also provided direct instruction in both print and cursive handwriting.
- ◆ OPS added a school counselor to the staff in 2016 to ensure that students' emotional needs were being addressed.
- ◆ OPS continues to be one of the few elementary schools in the county with a science lab and a dedicated science lab instructor.
- ◆ The OPS Odyssey of the Mind Teams have qualified for the World Championships every year since 2013.
- ◆ The Oradell Kids Foundation has donated more than \$16,000 over the past two years to provide programming and materials to enhance the educational experience for OPS students.
- ◆ In 2017, Oradell Public School was named a No Place for Hate Star School – one of the few elementary schools in New Jersey to earn the honor.
- ◆ Students in Grades K and 1 are using a new resource, “Foundations,” to ensure that while they are learning to love and comprehend text, they are also learning basic phonetic skills.
- ◆ Students in Grade 6 are utilizing a new math resource, “Big Ideas.” This is the same resource used by River Edge sixth grade classes and River Dell Middle School to ensure consistency across the tri-district.
- ◆ While OPS continues to evolve, we still embrace tradition. When this year's fifth grade travels to Sharpe Reservation, they will be continuing a tradition that began more than 40 years ago. Also, our sixth graders will participate in the HoOPS intramural basketball program, a tradition that began 28 years ago.
- ◆ In the past two years, the OPS community has donated over 2,000 items of food to Center for Food Action, over 800 pairs of pajamas to the Pajama Program of New Jersey, and too many containers of Play-Doh to count to the Pediatric Center for Tomorrows Children, along with making cards for the troops and blankets for the elderly.
- ◆ The Oradell PTA made a generous \$30,000 donation to purchase a book room with over 6,000 books for teachers to use with their students.

Oradell Public School: 90 Years Old & Still Standing Strong

Originally built in 1928, the Oradell Public School continues to be a building about which our students, families, and community can be proud. We consistently work to maintain and update the facility to ensure student safety and meet the needs of the OPS community. Over the last year, the following projects were accomplished:

- ◆ As the District's Energy Savings Improvement Program (ESIP) initiatives come to completion, the installed solar panels are now operational, saving money for the district.
- ◆ A full audit occurred of the internal and external speaker system, and additional speakers were added where necessary to ensure student safety in an emergency.
- ◆ One third of the building received a new roof this summer.
- ◆ Continual maintenance of trees around the building to ensure student safety as they walk to and from school also occurred this summer.
- ◆ In September, the PTA voted to engage in a long-term project to renovate the auditorium. Look for further details in future newsletters.

Board Earns Certification Award



The Oradell Board of Education was recently notified by the New Jersey School Boards Association (NJSBA) that they have earned the prestigious Board Certification Award. This award is granted to Boards of Education that have completed a rigorous series of training programs offered by NJSBA on the various aspects of Board operations. Some of the training covers areas such as Board Ethics, Finance, School Law, and Governance.

Board members worked together as a group over the past year to complete the training programs. The Board was honored for its accomplishment at a NJSBA awards ceremony (pictured above).

In the Award notification letter, Executive Director of the NJSBA, Dr. Lawrence Feinsod, wrote, "By meeting the NJSBA Board Member Academy's rigorous standards, your Board has demonstrated a high regard for effective governance and student achievement. Please note that your Board is among an elite group which has earned the award since its inception in 2007."

The Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act requires that the week beginning with the first Monday in October be designated as the Week of Respect in New Jersey schools. The week focuses on social emotional learning, encouraging children to see the positive role they can play as citizens of the OPS community. Activities during the week included conversations about what makes each classroom a special team, and numerous spirit days such as dressing in your most unique outfit to show that we embrace all in our community, as well as dressing as a superhero to recognize that we all have the power within us to advocate for others.

An additional highlight of the week was the PTA-sponsored Omegaman assembly, where Stone Hands taught students how each of them could be a dream maker instead of a dream breaker. These themes will continue to be reinforced during the school year.

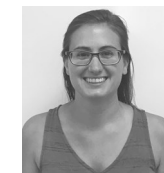
Gina Oldum, School Nurse
