### Superintendent's Message

Dear OPS Community

As shared in our September newsletter, the Board of Education in collaboration with the administrative team set four district goals for the 2023-2024 school year. At a recent Board of Education Meeting, administration reported on progress made toward achieving these goals.



The first goal reported on was the implementation of learning activities that foster creativity and result in increased levels of student engagement. Many of these activities have a STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) focus. Currently, fifth graders are working to design alternate farming methods, which will lead to a study of hydroponics in science class. Fourth graders have been busy creating advertising jingles in music class. This project weaves technology in as students digitally compose the music for their jingle. Sixth graders are working as inventors and entrepreneurs as they prepare prototypes and sales pitches for a new product they designed. This product often has an environmental component as students work to reduce the amount of waste in the world by making sandals out of water bottles, creating shoes with interchangeable soles or making reusable bamboo glue bottles filled with natural glue. Each of these experiences fosters creativity, engaging students

in the learning process while also improving collaboration, developing critical thinking, and honing communication skills.

The second goal reported on was efforts made to enhance the partnership between home and school through increased opportunities for family involvement in the learning process. One innovative strategy our sixth grade team is implementing is to have students write emails home to their parents about what they are learning and how they have recently demonstrated grit. The district is also working to increase the number of parent academies. This year numerous parent academies have been provided on topics such as the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights and the DIBELS (Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills) assessment, which is one of the tools used by teachers to assess student reading.

While providing information is one way to partner with families, providing opportunities for our families to experience learning with their children also increases the home school partnership. In kindergarten this may be through experiencing a Fundations lesson to better understand how students are building their phonics skills. In first grade, it may be spending time in a math center with students during March Mathness. In second grade, students and their families worked through the design process as they built leprechaun traps. Numerous other grades held writing celebrations. Each of these events provides parents with an opportunity to "see" into the classroom to better families to have a glimpse into the classroom understand the learning that children experience at OPS.



First grade families participated in math centers on Fridays in March as part of March Mathness. Events like this allow




#### **Did You Know...?**

- ♦ Safety and security is always on our minds Over the past several years, the district has had walkthroughs done by both county and state officials with a focus on how to best keep our building secure and our community safe. These walkthroughs have resulted in new purchases and new procedures. Sometimes these projects are large and visible such as the building of an enclosed lobby. Sometimes, these projects occur behind the scenes with implementation of new cameras, improved door access controls, and state-of-the-art alert notification systems; and sometimes, these projects are small operational upgrades like improved wiring to enhance the public address system or the purchase of a new two-way radio system to ensure constant communication inside and outside the building.
- ♦ The Oradell PTA is both the oldest and largest parent teacher association in the state. However, what truly makes them special is their ongoing support of the children of OPS. They regularly organize author visits and after-school book club programming. This year, they also donated over \$20,000 to support grade level and department mini grants. These grant funds will bring in additional assemblies to complement the curriculum and purchase additional resources such as digital cameras to support a new media arts unit in the art room and robotics materials to support opportunities in our growing STEAM lab.

## **Spring 2023 NJ Student Learning Assessment**





The New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) is administered each spring to students beginning in third grade. The assessment measures whether students are meeting expectations outlined in the state's standards in language arts and mathematics. Students in fifth grade are also assessed in science. Students are scored on a scale of 1 to 5. Students who score a 4 are deemed to meet the standards, and students who score a 5 exceed the standards. The data in the graphs to the left represents the percentage of students across the state, across the county, and at Oradell Public School who scored a 4 or 5. Oradell Public School continues to demonstrate high levels of performance.

Each year, the district uses NJSLA performance along with additional internal assessment measures to set goals, develop professional development plans and inform future resource purchases. The district is proud of the growth it has made in language arts over the past several years as it continues to strive to implement a language arts curriculum that incorporates instruction in word recognition and language comprehension. Mathematics is a current area of continued focus. As a result, additional funds are being used to contract with an external math consultant to assist teachers in how to best differentiate math instruction to meet the needs of all learners. The district is also working to revise its math curriculum and purchase additional resources to support that curriculum. The new curriculum will be implemented in September 2024.

#### PREPARING FOR KINDERGARTEN


Each step your children take on their educational journey will require a little more independence. As you prepare to send your children to kindergarten, some skills that will help them transition smoothly include:

- Knowing their legal first and last name.
- Being able to state their phone number and address.
- Putting on and taking off their own coat.
- Opening and closing lunchbox containers independently.
- Closing the car door when they get out in the drop-off lane.

And while these operational tasks will help children transition, the number one way to help them succeed as a learner is to read to them and talk to them. The development of verbal language skills is an important foundation for future academic success. Research states that students who read or are read to for 20 minutes a day will be exposed to 1.8 million words per year and are more likely to score in the 90th percentile on standardized tests. This is a daily routine you can begin building now. So, the number one way to help your children prepare for kindergarten is to get that library card and start reading!
